As I started to tell him the ways we use our two (2) service dogs in counselling, Dooly got up, walked between us and went across the hallway to a woman and leaned up against her. As Bill and I watched the interaction between Dooly and the woman who was now on one knee stroking Dooly's head and ears, I explained what had prompted Dooly to go to the woman.

## **2021: Joys, Challenges and Missions Accomplished**

A celebration of Joy! By mid-year, the LMVFM team was more than ready to resume our travels to congregations in response to requests for ministry visits and programs. With no rhyme or reason as to what restrictions politicians would mandate for their communities, it was anyone's guess as to when our travel would resume. Finally, as we approached the fall months requests for programs and seminars began rolling in, and not a moment too soon as we had been tracking a serious uptick in military suicides.



Training Seminars

Challenges: Today, Suicide rates among activeduty military members are currently at an alltime high since record-keeping began after 9/11. By the end of 2020, military suicides increased 25% over those in 2019. This year, research revealed that 30,177 active duty personnel and veterans who had served in the military after 9/11 died by suicide - compared to the 7,057 service members killed in combat in those same 20 years. That is, military suicide rates are four times higher than deaths that occurred during military operations. For military families and parents, whose service member already sacrifices so much to protect our freedom, this trend is extremely troubling.

It was truly a blessing when churches were able to safely resume their services and invite us to visit and provide them with much needed and timely training programs.

From August through November, the LMVFM



team provided training and attended conferences in Texas, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Ohio, Indiana, and North Carolina.

I was really looking forward to putting up a new ornament, a really cool pair of miniature desert combat boots, that a friend had given me as a gift. As I started to hang them on our tree I suddenly noticed a tag on them that read "Made in China." I couldn't escape the irony that the ornament had come from a country where Christians are persecuted, and can be put to death for their love of Jesus. As I looked at the other orna-

ments, all but the few that were hand-made, had also been made in China. Something had to be done, and we decided to remove the made in China ornaments from our tree. It was then that the seed was planted that has become a wonderful tradition for our ministry, our Christmas Ornament Adoption Appeal. Since then every ornament on our tree has been made by a veteran, or a military contractor or a family member. The adoption of those ornaments helps pay for the programs and services we provide for free to those who have served.
