Counseling has helped this veteran obtain and maintain employment, where there is a new sense of accomplishment and belonging.

Be Not Afraid

And you will hear of wars and rumors of wars. **See that you are not alarmed**, for this must take place, but the end is not yet. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and there will be famines and earthquakes in various places. Matthew 24:6-8 (emphasis added.)

Time and again, our Lord reminds us (either directly or through His angels) not to be afraid. Apparently, He knows our nature is to be fearful of the bad things that are happening to us now and of future things that we cannot

You see, we all face uncertainty in our lives. If you watch the news, you cannot escape the stories of how bad the economy is doing, including how inflation and interest rates are decimating senior's ability to be financially secure in retirement, or a young family's ability to buy a new home or vehicle. It affects the costs of groceries and fuel, and other daily expenses.

Our veterans face all of these same challenges, but they often face them at a disadvantage. Many struggle with depression, anxiety, and other symptoms of invisible moral and spiritual wounds. Stressors like a poor economy, political infighting or global conflict are enough to push them over the edge. It doesn't stop there.

"I look upon the spiritual life of the soldier as even more important than his equipment... The soldier's heart, the soldier's spirit, the soldier's soul are everything. Unless the soldier's soul sustains him, he cannot be relied upon and will fail himself and his country in the end." General George C. Marshall

Team LMVFM recently watched a short video of an Army Veteran pulled over on the side of a highway in Connecticut late one night. Because the situation looked suspicious, the police officer cautiously approached the vehicle. As he got up to the driver's side he discovered a sobbing male about 25-30 years old. He was on the phone with the VA's suicide line. The bodycam footage from the officer clearly shows a broken young man at the end of his rope. His sobs express a weary soul, tired of the stressors, who was fully willing to end the pain right there on the highway.

Much to his credit, the officer immediately understood the situation and calmly encouraged the man by offering him help rather than a ticket. The officer called an ambulance to the scene as a precaution, but more than that the officer showed mercy and love. After following the necessary safety protocol, including an abbreviated patdown, the Veteran asked the officer for a hug. With a snotty nose, and barely able to verbally speak, the Veteran nearly fell into the arms of the kind, willing officer.



When I think of what we at LMVFM offer to our Veterans, Contractors and their Family members, I think of the words Love, Mercy and Compassion, just as the police officer showed this veteran who was ready to end it all that night. Each day we remind them that Jesus loves them, and that His love has overcome the world and all of its stressors. Each veteran is comforted with the Good News, and shown that they do not need to be alarmed or fearful any more. General Marshall was right—healing begins in a soldier's heart, spirit, and soul. The way to bring healing is through showing Christ's love first and foremost.

The Harvest is Plentiful...

During a recent meeting of our Board of Directors, we opened with a devotion about praying for big things to a big God. If you can imagine it, pray for it! There is nothing too big for our Lord, King of the Universe.

profits fail within the first few years, and less than 30% survive ten years. So how has LMVFM avoided those statistics? Simple: God's blessing and your support!

Those blessings have been abundant, and we never cease to give thanks for them. And we never take them for granted. We believe God has given us a very clear and specific mission—to provide free counselling, and to educate caregivers of veterans to understand their unique chal-

Typically we share the latest statistics on suicides among those in the military. There is a

common number used often: 22 suicides per day. As if that weren't bad enough, the number is actually higher when we factor in problems with reporting suicide occurrences, and the manner surrounding the death itself. In short, we all have our work cut out for us in this mission.

When we consider the mission of LMVFM, we believe our mission "field" is made up of military veterans, contractors and their family members who struggle with the invisible wounds of war. We certainly believe that the harvest field is plentiful, and that God calls and equips this ministry and team members to work in that field.

So what now? Well, if anything we continue to march into the ever growing challenges faced by our veterans and their family members. Quite frankly the need for Gospel-based counselling and care for our veterans, contractors, and their families is at an all-time high. Incidents of suicide are on the rise as is a marked increase in depression, loneliness, and hopelessness among those we are serving.

The first challenge for us as a ministry is to connect with

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and engage and train individuals, congregations and others who are looking for ways to effectively reach out and share the hope that Christ alone has to offer to veterans and their families in their communities.

The second challenge for us is raising the necessary resources, that allow us to keep all of our counselling and care programs free to those we serve. Again, so what now? How will God do "far more abundantly than all we ask or think" as the scripture verse at the beginning of this newsletter states?

We know that whenever He provides an opportunity to serve others, He provides the tools to get the job done. He has equipped this ministry for the last

sixteen years, and allowed our team to serve in some amazing ways. We often sit back, take a breath, and ponder just how good our God is. Each team and board meeting begins with prayer, thanking God for His guidance, abundance, and mercy, and for you who help us as workers in His field.

Please pray with and for us, and for those we serve. Remember to pray big!
